
BLACK LIVES MATTER

The novel Coronavirus, COVID-19 is an evolving situation which has had a staggering impact in the United States and around the world. The virus has caused many businesses and nonprofits, PH International included, to face unprecedented challenges regarding operations and how best to move forward. PH faced the unfortunate reality of having all in-person program exchanges postponed indefinitely. However, PH Staff from all of our country offices have been determined and motivated to navigate this 'new normal' and to find innovative ways to quickly and efficiently adapt our international programming to online platforms to keep our participants and communities engaged. Check out below what PH offices in the United States, Georgia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Moldova, Armenia, and Ukraine have been doing to keep the PH momentum and mission moving during the COVID-19 global pandemic.



Youth Leadership through Sport (YLS)

In the Vermont office, Program Staff are not letting COVID-19 prevent them from interacting with their Youth Leadership through Sport (YLS) participants; they've just moved the interactions from actual courts to an online playing field! PH Staff are maintaining a unified YLS team spirit with participants and alumni from Kosovo, Kazakhstan, Ukraine, Moldova, and the United States through online activities such as group push up challenges, home work out content, and videos from YLS participants highlighting their impressive sports skills. The Vermont office has also created a virtual webinar series called *Power through Sport*, which serves as a way to keep alumni and participants inspired through webinars with professional athletes and live Q&A sessions.

PH Georgia

PH Georgia acted swiftly with the transition to online learning for their programs. For the Adjara Community Policing Initiative (ACPI), PH Georgian staff created a photo contest as well as virtual webinars, which discussed topics such as cybersecurity and road safety, to keep young learners engaged during the COVID-19 months. They created online debates to try out a new form of interaction between youth and police officers. The police officers selected the topics, and then two teams of 9th and 10th grade students were able to debate

the topic via Zoom. The debates have been met with much success with the youth enjoying this form of interaction with the police officers. Georgia's Schools, Community, & Police Engagement Program (SCOPE) has been able to lead legal culture classes online. The SCOPE program has created a virtual tour of a court building as well as an innovative educational online game called "The Police Officer", which aimed to build trust between youth and police in Georgia. Georgia's Momavlis Taoba (Future Generation) civic education program has been hosting live Facebook webinars, including a webinar with the director of USAID's Democracy, Governance and Social Development Office which received more than 290 comments and questions and has reached over 8,000 viewers and a webinar with the Executive Director of Transparency International Georgia which had over 2,300 viewers and more than 300 live questions and comments from students and civics teachers.




Momavlis Taoba (Future Generation) students prepared posters on the importance of maintaining good hygiene during the COVID-19 pandemic and shared them via Facebook



Bosnia & Herzegovina Legal Socialization Program (BLSP)

PH Bosnia and Herzegovina acted quickly to move their Legal Socialization Program (LSP) modules for participating primary and secondary school students onto online platforms during the last few months. All of the teachers, police officers, and school principals were highly supportive of this idea as it provided continuity in the implementation of the LSP modules during the pandemic. Also, for the nine primary and secondary schools that had not been visited for monitoring purposes prior to COVID-19, BLSP staff organized 'virtual monitoring' using different online communication tools (Zoom, Skype, Viber) to 'visit' schools. Promptly following the lifting of the ban on gatherings, staff were able to return to the office at the end of May and were able to meet face-to-face for a curriculum development meeting - PH masks and all.



The Ukraine English Access Microscholarship Program (Access)

PH Ukraine moved English Access Micro-scholarship Program (Access) classes to online platforms for students in 12 cities across Ukraine in April and May based on approved teaching plans. PH staff purchased devices/phones to loan to students from low income families who did not have access to a device that allowed them to get online. Four Access groups which are participating in the Access Alumni Civic Engagement Program also switched to online program activities and have been conducting online trainings for their peers, including trainings on the benefits of a clean environment and how to become an active citizen and good community leader. Lastly, PH staff scheduled online graduations and certificate-granting ceremonies starting on June 22 for Access groups which have completed a minimum of 330 hours of classes.



Moldova Legal Socialization Program Curriculum Development

PH Moldova, PH's newest office, has been hard at work developing a curriculum for their Legal Socialization Program (LSP) which will be implemented in schools across Moldova this fall. The Moldovan staff returned to the office mid-May and continue to work closely with the Curriculum Development Team online and inperson to develop the LSP curriculum which focuses on both in-person and back-up online education.

PH Armenia has shifted the English language instruction and enhancement activities of its programs to online learning via Zoom as their primary web-based resource. Students from underprivileged families have been provided with phones and reimbursement for some for the cost of internet connection to ensure that they have full access to programs and activities. The American Library and Training Center, which was established through the new Tavush Outreach Project, has facilitated Zoom trainings for 5 groups of 20 participants on the theme "Debate as Basis for Development of Civil Society," as well as Zoom discussions on books, films and conversations with guest speakers. Lastly, the Building English Language Capacity for Armenian Students and Teachers (BELCAST) program with the support of a US trainer is in the process of designing a curriculum for a 10-day online English language training for 10 Armenian teachers. These trained 10 teachers will afterwards go on to train, mentor, and support an additional 40 Armenian teachers next year.
